The Oklahoma Anthropological Society will return to the Andrews site near Muldrow, Oklahoma for its annual fall dig, September 15 thru 18, 2022. The society first visited the site the weekend of September 30 2017. Over 90 people enjoyed the fine fall weather at the excavation. Interesting artifacts and features encouraged the society to return to the site in future years



The 2018 dig at the site was rained out, and the society determined try again for a full week in the Spring of 2019. In spite of heavy rains the previous week and a soggy pasture, the society returned to the site May 10th to the 19th to follow up on the 2017 work.

If you haven't had the pleasure, I you suggest take the next opportunity to experience his demonstration of past huntergatherer tools and weapons and the skill needed to create a sharp flint-knapped tools.

Neil fashions biface implements and projectiles from Kay County chert using tools familiar to hunter-gatherers of the era, such as hammerstones, wood mallets, and antlers

President Ray McAllister opened the April 30 Meeting a 9:35 AM at the OKC Northwest Library.

The election of officers is coming next spring; Bob Blasing, Denton, and Mel Phillips Volunteered the prepare for process. Elected positions open are President, President. Secretary, Dig Committee Chairman. and Publication Editor.
